But more importantly, join us in our efforts to make AMIC a viable organization, able to adapt to the ever evolving media and communication environment, and to sustain operations and render services to its members.



AMIC's 25th Annual Conference: Continuing the Quest for Asian Communication Frameworks and Paradigms

According to an ancient Chinese proverb, To forget one's ancestors is to be a brook without a source, a tree without roots.

An old Philippine proverb says, Sino man ang hindi marunong lumingon sa kanyang pinang- galingan, ay hindi makakarating sa kanyang paroroonan. (He who does not think back on his past, will not arrive at his destination.)

We invoke this ancient Asian wisdom to warn, as we lunge headlong into today's fast- changing world, that non-Asian communication theories, sophisticated gadgets and apps are not the panacea to the world's problems. The solutions are in us.

We in AMIC and in Asia need to rediscover our roots, somehow buried under our feet as we run mindlessly forward. We have imbibed non-Asian ways, and adopted foreign communication theories, methodologies and practices as we studied abroad, and brought them back to Asia to teach to our young students who would one day become our disciples.

We preach that communication and culture are inextricably linked. But have we studied or developed Asian theories of communication based on Asian culture? Very little. In this coming 2016 AMIC annual conference, we pause and look back to where we came from.

We need to rediscover our "Asianess" amidst a resurging Asia. The Asian Development Bank has reported that if Asia continues its current growth trajectory, by 2050 it will regain the dominant economic position it held some 300 years ago, before the industrial revolution. In this scenario Asia's gross domestic product (GDP) will reach \$174 trillion (or half of the global GDP) from \$17 trillion in 2010.

A resurging Asia must also be seen in terms of new challenges characterized by inequalities, conflicts, climate change, unsustainable practices, and corruption. Beyond the tools of mass communication, are there distinct Asian communication strategies which can effectively address these challenges that threaten the resurgence of Asia?

This is the overarching concern of AMIC's 25th Annual Conference. This year's conference clusters will hopefully help us rediscover our Asian past so that we can confidently move into our future.

CONFERENCE SPEAKERS

CRISPIN C. MASLOG

Dr. Maslog is Chair of the Board of Directors of the Asian Media Information and Communication Centre (AMIC). Dr. Maslog started his journalism career as copy editor of Agence France-Presse in Manila before going abroad as a Fulbright-Smith Mundt scholar. He got his M.A. and Ph.D. in mass



communication at the University of Minnesota. A well-published writer and editor, he has authored or edited 35 books on media and communication. As director of the School of Journalism and Communications at Silliman University in Dumaquete City, he pioneered in research and extension work in community journalism in the Philippines and Asia. He won the Outstanding Filipino in Journalism and Literature Award (TOFIL) in 1995.

ROSARIO O. LAPUS

Having been educated in Switzerland, France, and the United States: Boston College, Harvard Graduate School of Education, and the University of Massachusetts-Boston, Dr. Lapus strongly believes in the value of global education and world-connected learning. Her areas of specialization are Human Development

and Education, with focus on early childhood, adult education and late life development, as well as girls' and women's education. She champions innovation and 21st century learning: STEM for girls, collaborative and inquiry-based approaches in education, and lifelong learning. The MC-Henry Sy, Sr. Innovation Center, the country's first Integrated Makerspace, was established because of her vision. She is a member of the Pi Lambda Theta and Sigma Phi Omega. She heads the Consortium of Women's Colleges in the Philippines and is very active in the Catholic Educational Association of the Philippines

and Philippine Accrediting Association of Schools, Colleges and Universities.

JOSE FRANCISCO B. BENITEZ

Dr. Benitez is President of Philippine Women's University. He received his PhD from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and his BA from Cornell University where he graduated with honors. He was one-time assistant professor in Comparative Literature in the University of Wisconsin. His research interests include multiple and often conflicting formations of modern subjectivity and the nation-state in the literature and film of insular Southeast Asia in the late nineteenth and twentieth centuries.



MEL V. VELARDE

Mr. Velarde is Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Asian Institute of Journalism and Communication. He has built a career in broadcasting, cable TV, telecommunications and information communications technology. He is President of Now



Corporation and served as President of Information Capital Technology Ventures, Inc. (Formerly, Cashrounds Inc.). He co-founded and served as Executive Vice President and General Manager of Sky Cable, the leading cable company in the Philippines. While with Sky Cable, he served as vice president for five years of the Cable and Satellite Broadcasting Associations, a network of more than 1,000 satellite and cable organizations in Asia. He chairs The Velarde Group, Inc. and is Chairman and founder of One Virtual Corporation.

FRANK LARUE

Dr. La Rue is UNESCO Assistant Director-General for Communication and Information. A Guatemalan human rights lawyer, he was UN Special Rapporteur for the promotion and protection of the right to freedom of opinion and expression from 2008-2014. During his tenure, he wrote and presented 10 landmark reports on the state of freedom of expression to the UN Human Rights Council and UN General Assembly.

MA. LEONOR G. ROBREDO

Vice President Maria Leonor "Leni" Gerona Robredo was initially known as the widow of the late Jesse Robredo – the beloved Mayor of Naga City and former Secretary of the Department of Interior and Local Government. VP Leni served as a Public Attorney and is a member of the alternative lawyers group

SALIGAN. After winning a seat in the Sixteenth Congress, she remained constant in her priority attention to farmers and fisherfolk; women, particularly in oppressive circumstances; and indigenous people.

CONCHITA C. CARPIO MORALES

Upon her retirement as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the Republic of the Philippines, Justice Conchita Carpio Morales was appointed as Ombudsman of the Republic of the Philippines in late July 2011. Her appointment was announced by President Benigno S. Aquino III during his second State of

the Nation Address in July 2011, making her the fifth Ombudsman since the Office of

the Ombudsman became operational in May 1988.

DASHO KINLEY DORJI

Mr. Dorji was former Secretary of the Ministry of Information and Communications in Bhutan. Before that he was Managing Director and Editor in Chief of Kuensel, Bhutan's national newspaper. He is a strong proponent of Gross National Happiness (GNH) as an alternative model for Human

Development. He currently lives in Thimphu with his three children and wife. He graduated from Mitchell College in New South Wales, Australia, and the Journalism School of Columbia University.

PLENARY 1 SPEAKERS

FLORANGEL Z. ROSARIO BRAID

Dr. Braid is a well known Filipino nationalist and communications expert. She served as a member of the 1986 Constitutional Commission and Chairperson of the Communication Committee of the UNESCO National Commission of the Philippines. She retired as President of the Asian Institute of

Journalism and Communication, but is still active as speaker on many issues concerning Philippine media, communication and development. She has authored and edited several books on Philippine communication. She regularly writes a column on media, communications and development for Manila Bulletin, the oldest continuing newspaper in the Philippines.

DHAVALASRI SHELTON A. GUNARATNE

Dr. Gunaratne is emeritus professor of mass communications with Minnesota State University Moorhead. A journalist turned media and communications scholar, he has taught journalism in Australia, China, Malaysia, and the United States. An inveterate traveler in his younger days, Gunaratne has devoted an entire

volume of his autobiographical trilogy to his travels. Gunaratne has blended Eastern philosophy, modern physics and systems approaches to introduce new theoretical frameworks that has enriched (mass) communication research. Around the turn of this century, Gunaratne turned away from reliance on West-centric communication studies to Eastern philosophies to derive communication concepts and theory.

RONNY ADHIKARYA

Dr. Adhikarya spent 40 years in international development assistance work, serving the World Bank, United Nations, and other international organizations. He was also associated with educational and research institutions such as Stanford University and East-West Center. He was trainor in many

learning institutions worldwide, including the World Bank where he directed the Knowledge Utilization through Learning Technologies (KULT) Program. Originally from Indonesia, Dr. Adhikarya since 1972 has undertaken professional assignments & official missions in 46 countries, and travelled to 89 countries. He has written eight books on communication, extension, training and education subjects published in Germany, Italy, England, USA, Singapore and Malaysia.

JOHN A. LENT

Dr. Lent taught journalism and mass communication from 1960 to 2011, including stints in the Philippines as a Fulbright scholar; Malaysia, where he started the country's first mass communication program; Canada, as Rogers Distinguished

Professor; China, as visiting professor at four universities, and the U.S. Prof. Lent pioneered in the study of mass communication and popular culture, comic art, and animation, in Asia (since 1964) and Caribbean (since 1968). He has authored or edited 82 books, published and edited International Journal of Comic Art (1999-), Asian Cinema (1994-2012), and Berita (1975-2001).

PLENARY 2 SPEAKERS

FRANZ-JOSEF EILERS, SVD

Fr. Eilers is a recipient of the first ever Titus Brandsma Leadership in Social Communication Award in recognition of his broad involvement in social communication. Known for his writings on social- and pastoral communication, Fr. Eilers has taught for many years in different universities, including the Pontifical



Gregorian and Salesian Universities in Rome. In 1968, he founded in Germany the very first academic journal for Christian Communication titled Communicatio Socialis. In 2001, Fr. Eilers initiated a graduate program in social and pastoral communication (MAT-SPC) at the University of Santo Tomas in Manila. From 1995 to 2010, he was the Executive Secretary for Social Communication of the Federation of Asian Bishops' Conferences (FABC-OSC). D.C., USA. He specializes in religion with a focus on Islam in Thailand and Southeast Asia, and in Muslim-Buddhist dialogue. Dr. Yusuf regularly writes on Islam, religion and Middle East for the Thailand-based Bangkok Post and The Nation.

SU-KYUNG HAN

Dr. Su-kyung Han is author of Pressejournalismus in Korea that examines how the media landscape in Korea has changed considerably in recent years through rapid technological development and the creation of new media.

LORNA Q. ISRAEL

Dr. Israel is a faculty member of the Department of International Studies of Miriam College. She was a Program Fellow of the Asia Pacific Development Center in Kuala Lumpur. She was also a Facilitator at the Institute of Women's Studies, and Consultant on Gender and BBM at the National Anti-Poverty Commission. She is also a member of the Editorial Board of the Journal of Humanities and Cultural Studies.



BINOD C. AGRAWAL

Dr. Agrawal is one of India's pioneers in holistic study and qualitative research and quantitative survey in development and communication. He has carried out formative, process and impact studies in information technology and television for two decades. His interests span anthropology, architecture,



design and planning, development, satellite communication and education. Until recently, Dr. Agrawal was Professor of Eminence and Director General TALEEM Research Foundation, Ahmedabad (2008-2015) which he founded as Director (1995-2008). He was Founder Vice Chancellor of Himgiri Zee University (formerly known as Himgiri Nabh Vishwavidyalaya) Dehradun (2005 - 2012) and Founder Director of Mudra Institute of Communications Ahmedabad (1993-1994).

Before joining academia, he was a journalist at The Straits Times.. He received his Ph.D. in Communication from Stanford University and a Masters from Columbia University's School of Journalism.

PEIXIN CAO

Dr. Peixin Cao teaches quantitative social research, qualitative social research and communication and media at the Communication University of China. His dissertation on Media Incidents: Power Negotiation on Mass Media in Times of China's Social Transition, is a study of how media incidents

in contemporary China break new methodological ground. It is founded on cultural and media studies perspectives that explain the political and historical complexities of China's present-day mediascape and demonstrate how, despite Chinese censorship of the media world, each media incident manages to widen, within the framework of the system, the scope of action of those involved.

LARS H. BESTLE

As Head of International Media Support's (IMS) programs in Asia, Africa and Latin America, Lars Bestle leads a department of head quarter and field staff carrying out policy advice, program design and implementation in numerous countries facing conflict or democratic transition in three vast and dynamic regions. Lars Bestle is a media and development specialist with

more than 15 years of experience in international development work specialised in independent media, democratization and good governance. Lars Bestle has a Master's degree (cand.scient.soc) in International Development Studies and Communications,

with on-the-ground journalistic media experience.

YVONNE T. CHUA

Ms. Chua is co-founder of Vera Files and assistant professor in the Department of Journalism at the University of the Philippines-Diliman, College of Mass Communication. She has trained scores of journalists in the Philippines and abroad, including Indonesia, Cambodia, Malaysia, Myanmar, Thailand,

Nepal and Mongolia. Ms. Chua has won several reporting awards, including first prize in the Jaime V. Ongpin Awards for Investigative Journalism for her report on corruption in textbook procurement for public schools. Her book, "Robbed: An Investigation on Corruption in Philippine Education," is a National Book Awardee for Journalism. In 2015, she was given the Titus Brandsma Award for Excellence in Journalism by the Carmelite Fathers.

ANG PENG HWA

Dr. Ang Peng Hwa trained as a lawyer and is currently professor at the Wee Kim Wee School of Communication and Information of the Nanyang Technological University's College of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences. Currently Director of the NTU's Singapore Internet Research Centre, his interests

cover Internet governance, censorship, media law and policy. He authored Ordering Chaos: Regulating the Internet (Thomson, 2005), which argues that the internet can be, is being and should be regulated. He was a member of 40-strong Working Group on Internet Governance that was appointed by then UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan to prepare a report for the 2005 World Summit on the Information Society.

AMIC ASIA COMMUNICATION AWARDEE FOR 2016

DHAVALASRI SHELTON A. GUNARATNE



As Asians are now asked to turn inwards for wisdom and guidance in this post-truth world, it is only fitting that the Asian Media Information and Communication Centre (AMIC) honors one of the pioneers in Asian journalism and mass communication who did just that as far back as a decade ago.

Shelton Gunaratne started his distinguished career as a journalist in Sri Lanka and went on to conquer new journalistic worlds in Malaysia, Australia and the United States. Go West, young man, he was told. He did, like many other Asian communication scholars of his generation, and eventually became the first Sri Lankan to receive a doctorate in mass communication from the United States in 1972.

He did come back to his roots briefly, to conduct pioneering research for his doctoral dissertation at the University of Minnesota, by studying the role of communication in rural development in Sri Lanka. The results were published by AMIC as one of its first research monographs in 1976.

He then switched to academe as a journalism educator for the next decade in Malaysia and then Australia. From there he went to the United States to teach at the University of Minnesota Moorhead (MSUM) from where he retired as a professor emeritus in 2007. All throughout his teaching career in the West, he continued his love affair with Asian journalism and communication.

After 2000, Gunaratne focused his academic energies on globalizing communication/journalism studies with his attempt to merge Eastern philosophies—particularly Buddhist and Daoist phenomenology—in his seminal book 'TheDao of the Press' published in 2005.

Gunaratne argues in this book that the classic Four Theories of the Press, articulated by Fred Siebert, Theodore Peterson and Wilbur Schramm since 1956, and which had become standard textbook in communication and society courses in Asia as in the rest of the Western world since then, was based on Eurocentric history, theory and practice.

Gunaratne said he wrote the Dao of the Press as an attempt to de-Westernize communication theory. This new book interprets press theory from the perspective of Eastern philosophy—particularly Buddhism, Hinduism, Daoism and Confucianism. Gunaratne proposes "a more humano-centric theoretical framework that reflects the marriage of Eastern ontology with Western epistemology."

Dr Gunaratne's development of a humano-centric theory of press freedom presumes a world system that reflects the characteristics of a yin-yang (libertarian-authoritarian) spiral-shaped continuum. Therefore, he argues, communication theory must concede the Daoist notion of diversity within unity (varying degrees of freedom in different countries) because it describes the reality of nature.

In recognising Gunaratne's ground-breaking scholarship and intellectual contribution to Asian media and communication research, the Asian Media Information and Communication Centre is privileged and honored to recognize Gunaratne as most worthy to receive the 2016 AMIC Asia Communication Award in research and education.

AMIC ASIA COMMUNICATION AWARDEE FOR 2017

WIJAYANANDA JAYAWEERA

Asia-Pacific's communication media landscape continues to evolve today into a free, developed, and dynamic setting. The imprint of Wijayananda Jayaweera in this continuing transformation cannot be denied.

In his career of about 50 years in the communication media sector—starting as a production assistant in 1969 at Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation up to his distinguished career as UNESCO Director of Communication and the International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC)—Wijayananda Jayaweera has either initiated or introduced "revolutionary" programs that are redefining communication policies, standards, and programs.

The Asian Media Information and Communication Centre (AMIC) 2017 Asia Communication Award recognizes Wijayananda Jayaweera for being an innovator in media development.

Jayaweera's initial major contribution to media development was the establishment in 1984 of Mahaweli Community Radio, a pioneering Asian community radio project. This facilitated the relocation of nearly 60,000 families under one of the most ambitious resettlement projects implemented by the Government of Sri Lanka. Throughout his career, he has played various significant roles in institutionalizing community radio in many other countries including Bhutan, Mongolia, Nepal, the Philippines, Thailand, and Vietnam. These initiatives were under the aegis of UNESCO and the Asia-Pacific Institute of Broadcasting Development (AIBD), among others.

As an institution builder, Jayaweera led the reform process for the Paris-based International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC), successfully reinvigorating it with renewed donor confidence as the main multilateral instrument to support the development of free, independent, and pluralistic media in the developing countries.

He was also instrumental in bringing safety of journalists and the issue of impunity to the Intergovernmental Council of the IPDC, and in making the Council a global oversight body on the issue by obliging UNESCO member-states to report on the judicial follow up of the killing of journalists in their respective territories.

During his tenure as Director, he led the crafting and introduction of Media Development Indicators, now regarded as the only set of internationally approved indicators to determine media development needs. It was also under his directorship that UNESCO set the standards for journalism education with UNESCO's Model Journalism Curricula and criteria for instructional excellence applicable to media training institutions.

Among his other significant initiatives is Media and Information Literacy (MIL), now a major pillar of UNESCO Media Development Programmes. In this age of post-truth, hate speech, and fake news, MIL has evolved as a potent tool in empowering media users to be discerning media consumers and responsible and ethical content producers.

AMIC also acknowledges the strong partnership forged between AMIC and UNESCO during his incumbency as Regional Communication Adviser for Asia and, later, as Director of the UNESO Communication Development Division and IPDC.

After his retirement from UNESCO in 2011, Jayaweera has remained passionate and active in promoting an enabling environment for free, independent, and pluralistic media in the Asia-Pacific and throughout the world as adviser in several communication programmes and projects.

In recognition of his outstanding contributions to media development, AMIC is proud to present the AMIC Asia Communication Award for institution building in 2017 to Wijayananda Jayaweera.
